

## Celebrating our Black History

The phrase "... teach them to your children, talk[ing] about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up" found in Deuteronomy 11:19, is a fitting principle to apply as it relates to our history. When we talk our history, we will not forget our past—from whence we have come. One person whom we should endeavour to talk about to our children and our children's children is Louise Bennett.

Louise Bennett was a Jamaican poet and cultural icon. She was born on September 7, 1919, and has been described by many as Jamaica's leading comedienne and the "only poet who has really hit the truth about her society through its own language".

Through her poems in Jamaican patois, she not only raised the dialect of the Jamaican folk to an art level but also captured all the spontaneity of the expression of Jamaicans' joys and sorrows, their ready, poignant and even wicked wit, their religion and their philosophy of life.

Her first dialect poem was written when she was fourteen years old. A British Council Scholarship took her to the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in London, where she studied in the late 1940s. After graduation, she worked with repertory companies in Coventry, Huddersfield and

Amersham as well as in intimate revues all over England.

In 1974, she was awarded the Order of Jamaica. She also received the Norman Manley Award for Excellence in the arts and a honorary Doctor of Letters degree from the University of West Indies. In 2001, she was made a Member of the Order of Merit for her contribution to the development of Jamaican Arts and Culture. Louise Bennett-Coverly died on July 26, 2006, in Toronto, Canada.

**This Thing Called .... FORGIVENESS**

Many of us carry around grudges and anger because of some wrong that some one has done to us. According to Smedes, "... as long as our minds are captive to the memory of having been wronged, they are not free to wish for reconciliation with the one who wronged us." Perhaps if we understand what forgiveness is not, and what it is, this will help us to better make the choice to forgive.

- Forgiveness does NOT condone the actions of the person who caused you hurt. By forgiving the person who caused you hurt, you are not saying that what the person did was okay. You are just deciding not to allow the wrong to affect your peace of mind.
- Forgiveness does NOT diminish the severity of the wrong that was meted out to you. By forgiving the person who caused the hurt, you are not saying that the harm he/she caused you was of no consequence. Indeed, you may still be dealing with the negative results of the actions, but by being willing to forgive, you are allowing yourself not to spend your energy on being angry.
- Forgiveness does NOT change what has past. It allows you to focus on your life from a pain free emotional state. The past no longer makes you cringe, cry or swear. Forgiveness simply helps you to let go of that negative baggage and makes a place for all the positive things you wish to have.

Forgiveness is not a gift that we are blessed with; it is a choice that we make—it is a decision to let go of resentment and thoughts of revenge. When we forgive, it opens the door wider for us to truly love ourselves, and to be able to act on God's commandment to love our neighbours as we love ourselves. To forgive is to set a prisoner free and discover the prisoner was YOU.

**Valentine's Day:** There are varying opinions as to the origin of Valentine's Day. Some experts state that it originated from St. Valentine, a Roman who was martyred for refusing to give up Christianity. He died on February 14, 269 A.D., the same day that had been devoted to love lotteries. Legend also says that St. Valentine left a farewell note for the jailer's daughter, who had become his friend, and signed it "From Your Valentine". Other aspects of the story say that Saint Valentine served as a priest at the temple during the reign of Emperor Claudius. Claudius then had Valentine jailed for defying him. In 496 A.D. Pope Gelasius set aside February 14 to honour St. Valentine.
