

ADVENT

Advent is a term from the Latin word 'adventus' which means "arrival" or "coming". Although the word "advent" is not found in the bible, the Old Testament prophecies foretold of the coming of Christ (the first advent). Do you know the significance of the candy cane?



A Candy Maker's Witness (*Anonymous*)

A candy maker in Indiana wanted to make a candy that would be a witness, so he made the Christmas Candy Cane. He incorporated several symbols for the birth, ministry, and death of Jesus Christ.

He began with a stick of pure white hard candy. White to symbolize the Virgin Birth and the sinless nature of Jesus; and the hard candy to symbolize the Solid Rock, the foundation of the Church, and firmness of the promises of God.

The candy maker made the candy in the form of a "J" to represent the precious name of Jesus, who came to earth as our Saviour. It could also represent the staff of the "Good Shepherd" with which He reaches down into the ditches of the world to lift out the fallen lambs who, like all sheep, have gone astray.

Thinking that the candy was somewhat plain, the candy maker stained it with red stripes. He used three small stripes to show the stripes of the scourging Jesus received by which we are healed. The large stripe was for the blood shed by Christ on the Cross so that we could have the promise of eternal life.

Unfortunately, the candy became known as a candy cane—a meaningless decoration seen at Christmas time. But the meaning is still there for those who *"have eyes to see and ears to hear."*

May this symbol be used as a witness to the wonder of Jesus and his great love that came down at Christmas and remains the ultimate and dominate force in the universe today.

Bring Christmas Cheer to a child: Many children in Jamaica face extremely difficult realities in their family circumstances and in their communities, often resulting in the government authorities removing them from the situation and placing them in the care of a State agency. The State facilities however, are not adequate to provide the nurturing environment for the physical, spiritual and emotional growth and development of each child in its care. As such, the Child Development Agency (CDA), is encouraging persons to foster a child for this Christmas (and throughout the year). Foster Care is aimed at providing a safe family haven for children aged between zero to 18 years who have become wards of the State as a result of being abused, orphaned, abandoned, neglected or unable to be cared for by their parents, relatives or guardians.
