



Mrs. Corey describes Mr. Corey as *"a person who is jovial, honest, loving and caring."* She recounted an incident that demonstrated his love and care for her. At one point during their marriage, Mrs. Corey was hospitalized. She highlighted that *"he came and visited with me every single day. He would leave work, go home and then come to visit me at the hospital. At that time, we lived in Harbour View and he would travel to the University Hospital of the West Indies—that long distance just to visit me. This just highlighted how much he cared."*

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Fathers who live outside of the home

Research on the impact of fathers suggests that the influence of a father's love on his child's development is as great as the influence of a mother's love. Fatherly love helps the child develop a sense of his/her place in the world, which helps his/her social, emotional and cognitive development and functioning. Moreover, a child who receives more love from his/her father is less likely to struggle with behavioral or substance abuse problems. Notwithstanding all of this information, the reality is that within many homes, for one reason or another, the father does not live with the mother and child.

The status of the father's relationship with his child's mother serves an important influence on father involvement. A father who does not live at home, is at high risk for becoming disconnected from his child/ren over time. Lacking a minimally close relationship with the child is likely to result in lower levels of paternal engagement of the child. A father may live away from home for several reasons e.g. divorce, work-related issues, serving prison sentence, or enrollment in police/military services. When this happens, it is often difficult - if not impossible - for the father to maintain the same type of parenting role with his biological child/ren, as would a father who lives in the home. This is due to the reduction in time spent with the child/ren. In other instances, the mother may make it even more difficult for the father to be integrally involved in the life of his child/ren because some mothers deliberately prevent the father from visiting in an effort to "spite" the father. This too, greatly affects the full involvement of the father in the life of his child.

However, although visiting the home regularly is of critical importance to the child, frequency of visit between father and child is not as high in value as the quality of the visits. The quality of the visits contributes to the child's well-being. So, to those fathers who, for one reason or another, do not live with their child/ren, you are encouraged to make the effort to contribute to your child/ren's health and well-being by maintaining a healthy relationship with the other parent even in cases of divorce; providing emotional and financial support, appropriate monitoring and discipline; and most importantly remaining a permanent and loving presence in their lives.
