

EDITORIAL: PENTECOST

"It's a family affair!" This is a most fitting phrase to describe today, being Circuit Family Day; and what better time to celebrate this family get-together than on Pentecost Sunday. FAMILY LIFE ISSUES: The amount of love and positive modeling we receive greatly influences our emotional, spiritual, and relational health. A lack of these essentials for wholeness produces a vacuum in our lives. When this is true, virtually everything we do is designed to meet the need for approval and acceptance and to avoid pain. We devise all kinds of ways to fill this vacuum, such as living in a state of denial, or focusing on work to avoid the reality, or act as escapists (use alcohol, drugs or sex) to numb the pain. We need to however, see the truth. Reality may be painful but without it we never will achieve growth and health in our lives. Filling the vacuum using the wrong approaches rob us of intimacy, strength and hope. The sooner we begin to realize how empty these alternatives are, the sooner we will begin to experience the refreshment of God's truth, God's Spirit and God's people. A SPECIAL VISIT TO THE PORT MARIA CIRCUIT



Many of you will remember that the Rev. Paul Mokake, first visited the Port Maria Circuit in 2006 where he preached and also shared in bible study sessions in practically all the churches in our circuit. He made a second visit to the circuit during this month, where he shared in the evangelistic services at Oxford for one week (May 6—11) and, he also preached at Galina on May 13th. But, what do you know about Rev. Paul Mokake?

Paul Wose Mokake was born on June 19. He is the third son of Samuel and Sarah Mokake in Buea, Cameroon, West Africa. His father died when he was four years old. Paul first came in contact with Christ as a Catholic. At the age of eleven, he made a commitment to become a priest. However, he ran away from the church in his late teens but was again called from darkness to light in his early twenties, where at that point, the Lord reminded him of the commitment he made as a child. He finally accepted the call into ministry at the age of 23.

Since 1990, he has been actively involved in doing the Lord's work in different capacities such as youth leader (secretary & president, pastor, teacher, and vice president of the Cameroon Baptist Theological Seminary, to name a few. His ministry passion is crusade and revival services, deliverance ministry and Spiritual Warfare. He is currently a student at the Palmer Theological Seminary in the United States. His family is in the Cameroon.



Rev. Mokake is married to Theresia Enanga, and they both celebrated their eighth wedding anniversary on May 22. Paul and Theresia have three children, Sarah Nduma, John Ndembe and Martin MacPaul Njie.
