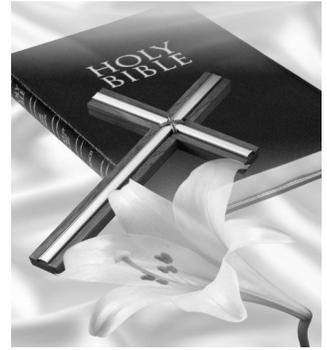

PUTTING YOUR HOPE AND CONFIDENCE IN GOD

The heart of the human being thrives on many things but it cannot thrive without something to hope for and someone in whom to place confidence. God alone is able to perfectly fulfill these needs of our hearts. Placing our hope and confidence in anything but God is like "expecting a tree to flourish in a barren desert." Such a tree will constantly be in need of water and may not survive. Like the tree in the desert longing for water, so our spiritual thirst will continue if we put our trust in things or in people, because objects (things) and people are unable to satisfy our deepest needs. Jeremiah 17:5-6 says *"Cursed are those who put their trust in mere humans and turn their hearts away from the Lord. They are like stunted shrubs in the desert, with no hope for the future. They will live in the barren wilderness on the salty flats where no one lives."*

We need to place our hope in the Lord for *"blessed are those who trust in the Lord and have made the Lord their hope and confidence. They are like trees planted along a riverbank, with roots that reach deep into the water. Such trees are not bothered by the heat or worried by long months of drought. Their leaves stay green, and they go right on producing delicious fruit"* (Jeremiah 17:7-8).

Putting our hope and confidence in God requires that we trust in the Lord with all of our hearts. Placing our hope and confidence in Almighty God will help us to know where God wants us to be, and in faith, we will allow Him to lead us to the place where He wants us to be.

- ◆ Prayer is both a gift of grace (from God) and an active response (by man)


Did you remember to pray this morning?
