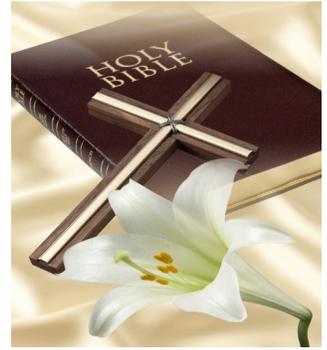

Deacon Joslyn Spence joined the Emmanuel Baptist Church family in 1955—yes! 55 years ago—while the Rev. Spurgeon Smith gave pastoral oversight. Deacon Spence indicated that prior to becoming a member of Emmanuel, he was a part of the Independent Baptist Church, however, since there were no Independent Baptist churches in St. Mary, he made the decision to be affiliated with the Jamaica Baptist Union. Deacon Spence said he was very close to Rev. Smith and they traveled to many concerts together and on one occasion while returning late at night from a concert in Kingston, they were involved in an accident. Thankfully, only the car was damaged.



In reflecting on the difference between church 'then' and church 'now' Deacon Spence notes that the sacredness of church has fallen and wish that we would go back to the high standards of sacredness that once existed for example, he believes that our dress code must reflect reverence and respect for God. He also observes that many persons are too casual in their 'operations' about God's work. He also notes that prayer is almost non-existent among some members.

Deacon Spence is the most senior deacon in Emmanuel and is the most senior Baptist deacon in this parish. He has been a deacon for 50 years. Deacon Spence has also served as president of the brotherhood, he sang with the choir and was at one time the choir master (while Sis. Bryan played the organ). Deacon Spence taught enquiries class and was also a Sunday School teacher. He was instrumental in forming three different Sunday Schools, namely in the Grants Town, Frontier and Trinity areas. Deacon Spence can also be a lay preacher.

Although we were not able to feature all the members who have served this local church for over 30 years, we truly give God thanks for your faith, commitment and the moral examples that you have charted for us. May God's choicest blessings be with you always.

A call to singleness

God has called many of His people to singleness, even if only for a portion of their lives, but few understand the great honour it is to serve the Lord in this way. Marriage is blessed and ordained by God, and the single life is just as valid and allows people to commit all of their energy to serving Him. Unmarried Christians have an incredible opportunity to impact this world with the Gospel.

Many singles make the mistake of putting their lives on hold until they marry and "get a real life." This idea is detrimental to unmarried Christians and the Church. If every Christian who is single dedicated him/herself to the Lord, lived life fully, recognized his/her extraordinary value, and used all of his/her talents and opportunities to serve, there would be almost no need left in churches and ministries. Singles need to stop believing the "I am missing something" lie and accept the call to obey and serve God with their whole heart, mind, and strength. Marriage may or may not be a part of God's plan for you so it is time to live the life you have now and trust God for the rest.

The Church as a whole needs to do a better job of recognizing and appreciating the rich resources God has provided through the lives of single believers. Often, church programs and ministries focus almost entirely on the family which can leave singles feeling ignored, unimportant, and unwanted. God can work through all believers who walk in obedience to him - married or single - so churches should do their best to include people in all stages of their lives in ministries and activities.

Christians need to remember that marriage does not make a person whole, only accepting Jesus as Lord and Saviour brings wholeness. Sadly though, many Christian singles feel pressured, even from other Christians, to seek a mate rather than to seek the will of God for their lives. This pressure often causes confusion for the person who is called by God to the single life, and that confusion sometimes leads to wrong decisions. Christians can be called to singleness permanently or temporarily but in either case, we must dedicate our lives to serving the Lord and walking in obedience to Him - regardless of our marital state.


The Mission of the Caribbean Baptist Fellowship is to encourage and facilitate the coming together of Caribbean Baptists at national and regional levels for worship and fellowship, and for shared witness and ministry. To this end the, CBF provides its member bodies with opportunities to be inspired, motivated, encouraged and equipped for service. The CBF is also an agent through which Caribbean Baptists can pool and channel their human and financial resources towards carrying out the Great Commission of Jesus Christ and expressing in word and deed the love of God for every person within the Caribbean region and beyond.

The CBF has different departments which can serve as avenues for greater involvement in the work of Christ. Departments include Caribbean Christian Publication (CCP) - producers of Sunday School literatures), Youth, Women's Federation, Men's Brotherhood, Christian Education/Stewardship and Evangelism/Mission.

Caribbean Christian Publication (CCP)

The CCP is one of the departments of the CBF. This department is responsible for, among other things, the publication of the Sunday School and VBS literatures that we use within our Baptist Churches. The Sunday School curriculum guides, called **The Together Series**, are used in over 27 islands/countries by an estimated 1000 churches. Distribution exceeds 50,000 pieces per issue. While Baptist churches remain the largest user denomination, the Sunday School literature is now used by churches of 26 other denominations. The CCP is currently seeking editors.

All of us can help in supporting CCP and our assistance is vital to the CCP's survival. The CCP invites us to partner with them by including them in our mission budget. Gifts of any size that you, your church, circuit, association, convention or union may be able to make to the ministry will help to pay staff, print, distribute the literature, and cover the ever-increasing operational overheads. Help the CCP to increase their circulation and ensure that more churches will find out about the products published especially for their Sunday Schools by introducing the Caribbean Bible Lessons to your church friends and encouraging them to purchase the guides.
