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## EDITORIAL: HAPPY BIRTHDAY JESUS

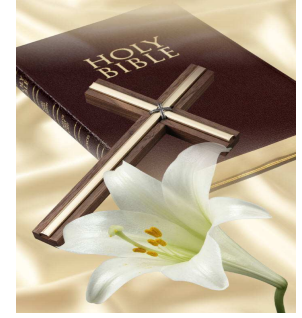
One very important date in a person's life is his/her birthday. Remembering birthdays signifies how special that person is and through birthday celebrations we learn truths about the person being celebrated. Today we celebrate the birth of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ (*and we have already established that He was not born at this time of year, but this is the time that has been used to observe this great event in history to show how significant Jesus is*). In our celebrations of Jesus' birth we should recognize two important truths.

First, Jesus entered the world as a human being like each one of us. As a child, like us, he was dependent upon others to survive; he faced the elements of cold, hunger, thirst and other stresses. Thus, His birth signalled that *"the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us"* (St. John 1: 14, NIV). Second, Jesus is still here with us in the person of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is here dwelling among us but in this form, we are dependent on Him for our spiritual empowerment as depicted in Acts 1:8 *"But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be My witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."*

As the birth of Christ is celebrated, may we find the time to invite Jesus to dwell in our hearts today; and not just today but always—so that we can be empowered to accomplish His mission, to bring good news to lost souls. On this Christmas day, let us remember that special person—Immanuel—the one who is always here dwelling with us and among us—Jesus!

## WATCH NIGHT SERVICES

Many of the Watch Night Services in Black communities that we celebrate today can be traced back to gatherings on December 31, 1862, also known as "Freedom's Eve." On that night, Americans of African descent came together in churches, gathering places and private homes throughout the nation, anxiously awaiting news that the Emancipation Proclamation had become law. Then, at the stroke of midnight, it was January 1, 1863, and according to President Lincoln's promise, all slaves in the Confederate States were legally free. People remained in churches and other gathering places, eagerly awaiting word that Emancipation had been declared. When the actual news of freedom was received later that day, there were prayers, shouts and songs of joy as people fell to their knees and thanked God.
