

**WALKING WOUNDED:** "Walking wounded" is a term that is used in the medical field to describe a person who has injuries—physical or otherwise (e.g. brain injury), but despite the injuries, the person is conscious and breathing and is able to walk. Because such patients are able to walk and can do simple and regular every day activities, they appear to be functioning at normal levels. Doctors are now realizing that "being normal" is far from true with persons who have been categorized as being "walking wounded". In fact, the term walking wounded suggests that these patients require immediate attention if they are to fully recover and become whole. Thus, medical practitioners are spending more time to rehabilitate these persons—the "walking wounded".

Many persons in our church are "walking wounded". They appear to be functioning at normal levels on a daily basis but this is far from true. On the inside, they are carrying around different kinds of issues and hurts that have been left unattended.

Many persons in our church have been hurt from childhood—hurt by verbal, physical and/or sexual abuses. Some persons are depressed and feel suicidal; some persons are stressed from being unemployed and others from the limited finances to cover mounting expenses; some are saddened over the loss of family/friend through death, separation and/or divorce. Some persons are mentally overwhelmed in having to deal with cancer, diabetes and hypertension and having to struggle with thoughts of abortions that took place many years ago.

Like the medical practitioners, we must pay attention to, and give medical, physical, emotional and spiritual support to our brothers and sisters who are "walking wounded". We must help in the restorative process by helping them to get to the bottom



## Celebrating Lent: A Different Approach to Fasting



Fasts have a tendency to be oriented toward things like giving up food or television. But there are many other creative ways we can welcome Jesus' healing touch.

Here are suggestions you may want to consider.

- Fast from anger and hatred** (Give our family members an extra dose of love each day)
- Fast from judging others** (before making any judgments, recall how Jesus overlooked your faults);
- Fast from discouragement** (Hold on to Jesus' promise that He has a perfect plan for you);
- Fast from complaining** (When you find yourself about to complain, close your eyes and recall some of the little moments of joy Jesus has given you);
- Fast from resentment and bitterness** (Work on forgiving those who may have hurt you);
- Fast from spending money unnecessarily** (Try to reduce your unnecessary spending and give the savings to the poor).
